Member Spotlight: George Hart

George Hart has been a PPPS member since 2007. He always has a smile, positive attitude and a kind word for everyone. George describes himself as a "people person."

He has been facing adversity with his health problems of needing a heart valve and stints, as well as his wife's breast cancer battle.

George started life on a small farm in Illinois, with living conditions only a little better than Abe Lincoln's "log cabin" days! His first art supplies were a Number 2 pencil and an occasional piece of scrap paper.

Hearing and speech impairment in childhood caused problems in grade school for George. He was labeled unteachable, and was relegated to a desk in the furnace room by himself. The labels continued in high school, until his parents had him tested. George went on to become Valedictorian of his class, and he became a teacher of middle and high school sciences. George also taught college classes. He was a counselor as well.

George has been active in the community, working with at-risk kids through the Colorado Outward Bound Program, focusing on environmental experiences and hiking.

After being discouraged by art teachers in high school, George did not pursue art until later in life. His first experience was a week-long program, but the instructors were very discouraging. However, the kindness of the other students got him through the week, and George continued to pursue art.

Since he is a lover of the outdoors, George mostly paints landscapes in all mediums, most recently in watercolor. He has taken many workshops and classes and has pursued his art dream no matter what obstacles have been in his path.

George paints with and from his HEART and he encourages everyone to do the same. He suggests we

The core of Cliff's art is the relationship of light on shape using line and tone and color as it wraps and flows around the landscape and cityscape. He has won many awards in Pastel and Oil in national shows around Colorado.

PPPS Member Becky Johnson's August Workshop

Thanks to PPPS members who participated in my recent workshop. Presenting the August workshop at Library 21C sponsored by Pikes Peak Pastel Society was a great experience.

My focus for the day was to offer some demos and suggestions that might facilitate later landscape paintings for participants. I chose to work on specific landscape elements rather than trying to complete a finished painting. The teaching format was effective in allowing everyone to explore the demonstrated techniques based on the distributed photos. Reference photos included foliage, rocks and water found in the western landscape of the US.

Artists were asked to bring whatever they had in the way of pastel materials and personal setups, plus a variety of pastel papers. This helped to minimize supply expenses and added to the variety of landscape paintings developed. I emailed everyone photos prior to the workshop so they would have the same reference material that I was using for the demos.


I did four demonstrations throughout the day and then periodically roamed the room to see participants' applications as well as make a few suggestions. It was fun to share some hints and ideas that I've acquired in my years as a pastel landscape painter.

It was wonderful to see participants' ability to adapt application ideas that I made during the demos, but more than that, I was just so impressed and gratified by everyone's enthusiasm.

The apron is 100% cotton fabric with an adjustable neck strap and two pockets with a large emboidered PPPS logo.


The tumbler is made from double-walled stainless steel, designed to keep beverages hot or cold for hours and includes a push-on lid with metal straw and a large PPPS logo.

Way to Go Becky!

PPPS member Becky Johnson received an email in October from Richard McKinley, President of IAPS, letting her know that with her recent acceptance into the IAPS show. She has achieved Master Circle status.

Becky now has the PSA (Pastel Society of America), the PSWC (Pastel Society of the West Coast), the PPPS signatures and the IAPS/Master Circle. All of these were achieved in the last three or so years after she began entering shows with these goals in mind.

In order to achieve the IAPS/MC status, artists must accrue five points, earning one point for each acceptance into an IAPS show, and one point for each award at an IAPS show. Becky has had five paintings accepted into IAPS shows.

Usually IAPS has two shows a year, one brick-andmortar such as the convention show or another venue on off years, and one online show a year.

Becky began entering in 2017 and had *Spring Break* accepted that year. In ensuing years, she missed entering at least a couple of times but she entered and didn't have an accepted painting at least three times Spring Break, As Far as the Eye Can See and New Mexico Evening were all in brick-and-mortar events. When the event is held in a physical location, artists are asked to write a short description of the work or the artists' technique, etc.

Becky didn't start entering major juried shows like PSA or IAPS until late 2015. Since she's completely self-taught, she has always wondered how her work would stack up against pastelists who had formal educations and/or had taken or given workshops across the US and outside the country. Becky can happily say that it is possible to gain society signatures and recognition like the Master Circle by doing your own best work. She encourages any artist to pursue these sorts of awards if it's something they want to do.

IAPS is the International Association of Pastel Societies. Members of local/state/regional pastel societies that are part of IAPS also 'belong' to IAPS with no additional fees. All current members of PPPS are able to enter IAPS competitions. If your work is accepted, you'll be asked to send verification of membership.

PPPS National Juried Exhibition

31 beautiful pieces from 15 pastel painters were on display at Library 21c for the month of October.

The Opening Reception was held on the morning of October 8th, with delicious pastries and coffee. Awards were presented by Lynn Farrell with comments from our juror Tim Deibler:

Best in Show

Autumn Reflection Becky Johnson

I love the mood created in this piece. The subtle tones with just a pop of red makes for the perfect feel of autumn. The superb details in the trees contrast nicely with the simplicity of the reflections. I especially like that more of the trees are reflected than actually seen.



Snow Day Katie Cassidy

The first thing that caught my eye was the contrast of the geometric shape of the vehicle and the organic shape of the tree branches. Also the orange color of the vehicle complements the blue of the snow and makes the painting feel even colder. The diagonal of the branch and the way the detail in the trees diminish as they recede into the distance enhance the cold atmosphere and create a perfect composition.



2nd Place

Backyard Connie Cassani Beard

The energetic application of color and the dramatic use of values make this piece a real attention getter. I especially like the cool tones of the house in the shadow surrounded by the sunlit areas of yellow and green.



Honorable Mention

Garden of the Gods with Shadows II Susan Tormoen

The playful interpretation of shapes and linear strokes makes this a delightful piece. The complementary orange and blue tones make for a strong visual color harmony offset very nicely with the various tones of green.

Beckoning Betsy Cook

The bold colors and the eye-to-eye connection along with the darker background shapes make this a dynamic composition. I particularly like the cropping and the various textures created by the use of broken color in the background in contrast with the more solid rendering of the deer.

The contrast of the bright sun and dark shadows help set the mood. The captivating use of angles and the visual play of yellow and purple make this a super dynamic piece.





Still Life Painting in the Chiaroscuro Style: A 2-Day Workshop with Tracy Wilson

March 2023, Days TBD, at Library 21c

You are invited to join this fun and informative workshop where painting still life in chiaroscuro (light and shadow) will be explored. In this structured workshop you will learn a dependable procedure for creating, evaluating, and painting



a still life through instructor demonstration and discussion. Topics covered include: lighting and setting up, composing, identifying problem areas before painting, and thinking in terms of light and shadow shapes. Students are given the opportunity to paint several small study paintings with continued emphasis on basic painting fundamentals.



VOCABULARY OF TERMS:

Primary Colors: Red, yellow, and blue. Cannot be made by mixing other colors. **Secondary Colors:** Orange, green, and violet—each made by mixing two primaries.

Tertiary Colors: The six tertiary colors are made by mixing one primary with an adjacent secondary color. Eg. (primary) red + (secondary) orange= red-orange.

Warm Colors: Reds, oranges and yellows. Warm colors advance toward the viewer. **Cool Colors:** Greens, blues and violets. Cool colors recede from the viewer.

Hue: The name of a color - red, orange, yellow, green, blue, purple.

Chroma (Intensity): The purity of a color which determines its varying level of saturation from bright to dull. **Value:** The relative lightness or darkness of a color. Refer to a gray scale to compare values between the extremes of white and black. Typical value scales use 9 steps of value in addition to white.

Tint: A color plus white. **Tone:** A color plus gray.

Shade: A color plus black. **Neutral gray:** A balanced combination of white and black.


